A Little Bit Helps the Medicine Go Down

When I entered seminary, one of the first things our professors began to help us with is the practice of developing a “sermonic mind.” In other words, they helped us look at our lives and the lives of other people through the mental prism of our theological studies and the scripture from our faith tradition. You would often hear a student in our class say, “That’ll preach!” when someone said something intriguing or perhaps something they read gave them an idea for a sermon. Of course, whenever one is learning to think in a new way, beginning students can have the tendency to become a bit obsessed with their new way of looking at the world. Pretty soon new seminary students find themselves coming up with sermons for the most mundane things in life, such as creating sermons about doing your laundry, or buttering a piece of bread, or snoring. Seminary is like law school — you may not remember all the case law and ordinances, but you do learn to begin to “think like a lawyer,” or, in the case of seminary, “like a preacher.” You begin to make meaning of the times you experience.

One of the small graces that God gives us is the ability for all of us to begin to think of our lives in theological, or some would say spiritual terms. When you begin to reflect on the events of your day and do more than just grouse about them or thank your lucky stars for whatever happened to you that day, and you take a few moments to spiritually reflect upon whatever it was you just experienced, you can begin to make meaning of these events that will feed your spirit and help you grow theologically or spiritually.


Abigail Johnson has written a piece for the Alban Institute (a kind of minister’s think tank) entitled *Reflecting with God: Connecting Faith and Daily Life in Small Groups* (2004). She writes about the value of increasing your faith by doing theological reflection within a small group of people. But you can also do this at home. Johnson writes that “theological reflection is simply wondering about God’s activity in our lives. Where is God present? What is God calling us to do?” She says that by “seeing our experiences through the lens of [our] faith we become clearer about our connection to God.” These questions can be concerned with our

family life, our work, our play, a gorgeous sunset, our views on government, or just any situation that faces us or others in this life. Johnson suggests these steps in doing theological reflection:

- (1) Identify an event or situation on which to reflect;
- (2) Name and describe your feelings about the situation ("I felt anger. I felt sadness. Etc.);
- (3) Explore what you think about the situation and what dynamics are at play (what are the power dynamics in the situation, for instance);
- (4) Connect with God and ask where God is present in your chosen situation;
- (5) Think about what you have learned from this reflection;
- (6) Pray.

I might also add that if you have a good Bible concordance, you can look up words that come to you during your reflection and find out how and when they are used in the scriptures. Another way to do this spiritual or theological reflection is to take the Daily Lectionary readings that are included in each month's *Kalos*, read the text first, and then reflect on what the verses are saying to you and how they connect with your life experience.

So why do all this? Well, we have been hearing a lot lately about the Bread of Life. Many of our lectionary readings have dealt with telling the story of how Jesus told people that he was the Bread of Life that you could eat and never be hungry. Thinking theologically or spiritually helps us consume that priceless bread that God has given to us. But I also think reflecting in this way helps us grow as spiritual beings and relate to one another, and to life in general, with reverence and thoughtfulness. It also can help us find great meaning in the little "stuff" of our lives and can help us extend the grace that we find in everyday living to our neighbors. You don't have to go to seminary or develop an obsessive sermonic mind, but a little reflection each day with God can help the medicine of life's lessons go down just a bit better! God's grace be with you.

- (2) Nursery care during church services will need a new provider as Amanda Phillips is leaving sometime in the fall..

JV Board Meeting

August 15, 2006

Members Present: John Graham; Carol MacDonald; Mary Leal; Rev. Kevin Smith; John McPherson; Ron Howie; Melanie Click; Jackie Whitlock; Betty Benson; Katie McCormick, Director of Christian Education and Youth Director.

Minutes from the June 20, 2006 were approved.

Treasurers Report: Mary Leal – The budget presently show that we are \$3200.00 under budget partly due to more usage fees. The bonds will end December 2006. They were to end June 2006 but were deferred until December 2006. Report was approved.

Ron Howie stated that he initiated a building fund by donating \$600.00 which has grown to \$5000.00. This money could be used for building additional classrooms. He also mentioned air conditioning the Fellowship Hall. He will look into it and report back at the next JV Board meeting in September. Rev. Kevin suggested that he check out an “environmentally friendly” unit such as a heat/cooling pump.

Katie McCormick brought to the Board the announcement that Robin and Terry Root were giving up the Senior High Youth Group due to her increased work schedule. There will be a celebration of their service to the youth at a BBQ on Sunday, August 27.

Katie McCormick and Ron Howie suggested that there be a ¼ paid position for the SHG Youth Leaders. This has been approved by both the ECA Vestry and the AVUCC Council. There was much discussion by the Board as to what the procedure should be for hiring someone for the position. The JV Christian Education Committee will write up a job description for the interim as well as the permanent position and the procedure for hiring. Katie will send the approved job description and procedure for hiring on to the JV Board for their approval along with the required salary arrangements. The interim will serve from September 2006 until June 2007 when a permanent replacement will be hired.

John McPherson will take care of the storage of the Nativity Scene. John will also over see the fixing of the water leak by the Rose Garden until a new system can be installed next spring. No one has volunteered to help with

the Rose Garden. An announcement will be made at each church service.

The carpets were cleaned and they look very nice. Ron Howie closed the meeting with prayer. Next meeting will be September 19 at 7:30PM.

Almaden Valley United Church of Christ - AVUCC is up and running! Thanks so much for your interest!

As you know, GoodSearch is a Yahoo-powered search engine with a unique mission - 50% of its advertising revenue, about a penny per search, is shared with the nonprofits selected by its users. The more people use GoodSearch, the more money will be directed towards your cause. The sky is the limit!

Here's an example of how much your organization can earn: * 100 supporters search the internet just twice a day = \$730/year; * 1,000 supporters search the internet just twice a day = \$7300/year.
