Let us walk humbly among every living thing that God loves and created. ### **Men's Discussion Group, October 2007**

#### **Topic of discussion: Science and Religion**

In the beginning was the big bang. But what exactly banged? How did it bang? And what happened before it banged?

In fact, the big bang theory has never really been the theory of a bang at all. It describes the aftermath of a bang--the ongoing ballooning of space itself as the matter of the universe flies apart. But

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the theory says nothing about what caused this spectacular expansion. It gives not even a clue about what banged, what caused it to bang, or what happened before it banged. In other words, the theory sheds no light on the underlying physics of the primordial fireball.

The very structure of the universe is derived from an irregular pattern that can be traced back to the beginning of time. This expanding pattern has formed time, galaxies, stars, planets, light, energy, matter, dark matter, dark energy and us. It is hard to draw a terrain analogy to something as universal as the beginning of all things. Maybe this initial pattern was designed like a clump of clay. Designed by whom, maybe God, maybe a roll of some dice? But dice were not invented yet. One of my favorite quotes by Albert Einstein is "God does not play dice with the universe." However, in quantum theory the element of chance is always a consideration, unlike other physical sciences. The observer of a quantum event does affect the outcome.

What I came away with from our discussion was that science and religion for the most part work well together. Science asks questions of how things work, how do they interact with each other, and what can be verified. Religion asks the question of why are we here. Religion also guides us in the manner in which we live and asks us to have faith in things we cannot see, like faith in God or in each other.

Many religious texts try to answer both questions. Considering when some of these texts were written, they have come very close to the scientific answers. Back in history the professors or learned people were also the priests and rabbis of their day.

One thing that science and religions do is to refine themselves. Science constantly tries to disprove itself. Scientific theories are always being re-examined and refined. Religions go through a process of refinement, but this process takes a really long time and often involves a lot of social upheaval and sometimes bloodshed like the birth of Buddhism in India, Islam in Africa, the protestant reformation in Europe, and the formation of the Anglican Church in England.

Over time, our knowledge of the universe will continue to be refined and expanded (no pun intended to the cosmic inflation theory). The origin and future of the universe are questions better answered by science. Understanding of our purpose in that universe and our belief in God, a power greater than ours, that is where religion and faith can help us.
